Nationals Premium Out in July

ATCA Fur Tests Get Even More Exciting

For the fourth year in a row, our breed's parent club, the Airedale Terrier Club of America, will hold an ATCA Fur Test on Friday of our Nationals. This year, that's Sept. 7th. These tests become even more significant this year due to their AKC approval as a "parent club" test, which went into effect in February, 2018. That means that if your Airedale qualifies at an ATCA Fur Test, you may register that new ATCA title with the AKC, and that title will then appear on your dog's permanent AKC record. It will be on your dog's pedigree, and when you enter more AKC events, it can be included in AKC event catalog. In this way, your dog's "credentials" as a fur-hunter will follow his name just as any obedience, agility or other AKC performance title.

Our appreciation to members of the ATCA who worked with the AKC for this title recognition. You can find the form needed to register your Fur Title with the AKC on our website's Links/Resources section or by this direct link: <u>http://</u> <u>images.akc.org/pdf/</u> <u>App_for_Approved_Parent_Club_PE.2.2018.pdf</u> In addition, the names of the ATCA Fur Test titles have changed. Formerly, ATCA and HWA Fur Test qualifiers could earn Junior Hunter Fur (JHFur), Senior Hunter Fur (SHFur) and Master Hunter Fur (MHFur) titles. The "replacement" titles are Junior Fur Tracker (JFT), Senior Fur Tracker (SFT) and Master Fur Tracker (MFT). This is what will appear in the AKC records.

The rules and running of the ATCA Fur Test and the HWA Fur Test are identical. One more new and nifty thing: The ATCA ribbons for Fur Test qualifiers are big black and tan rosettes. You should try to get one in September at our Nationals!

How to Train for a Fur Test

As this year's Fur Test at the Nationals will be a joint effort by HWA and ATCA we'd love to have a strong representation of dogs and owners from both clubs running this test. And while most Airedales have good noses and a liking for chasing critters in the yard, running a good Fur Test goes better with some special training. And so, we repeat these tips that we publish every year:

You'll need some some raccoon scent (we recommend Cronks Scent, available at

www.fntpost.com or similar stores you'll find online); a raccoon pelt (check Ebay for a good buy, or from www.fntpost.com when you order that scent), and an area outside of your dog's usual yard with some trees for laying the scent and dangling the pelt. HWA Nationals' Judges Announced

We're pleased to announce our slate of judges for the 2018 HWA Nationals.

ATCA Fur Test Judges will be Lawrence Alexander, Chris Halvorson and Kim Burrier. These three judges repeat their duties by virtue of their combined years of experience with the HWA/ATCA Fur Test program. Kim Burrier will serve as the liaison with the ATCA Hunting and Field Committee.

This year's HWA Upland (Flushing) Test are John Dudash and Rick Abolt. John has judged our HWA tests in the past, bringing his experience as an AKC-licensed Upland (Spaniel) Test judge and his training /handling of his English Springer Spaniels to our Airedale tests. Rick Abolt is new to our HWA tests, but he is familiar with Airedales from judging them in AKC Upland Tests. Rick's Waterloo Kennels in Maryland concentrates on Labrador Retrievers for upland and waterfowl hunting and tests.

HWA's Retriever Test judges are Patricia Rose and Leslie Phillips. Pat Rose repeats her role as last year's HWA Retriever Test judge, noting that her personal experiences with field training and hunt testing her Standard Poodles for AKC Tests give her an insight into our Airedale efforts to "break into" the hunt test world with a non-traditional breed. As Pat Rose recently put a Master Hunter (AKC Retriever) title on Lucas, her young Poodle, she is an accomplished trainer as well as being a judge. Leslie Phillips has participated in HWA Nationals since our events at Buckeye Game Club. In recent years, Leslie has brought her experience as an AKC-licensed Retriever judge and Flat Coat Retriever exhibitor to our Nationals at Holly Hills.

The Hunting Instinct Test will again welcome Airedale breeder Sherri Glass as our main evaluator. Sherri has decades of experience in breeding and evaluating Airedale puppies for their performance potential as well as their correct conformation. Add that to a sense of humor that appreciates whatever an Airedale pup can come up with makes her evaluations well-tuned to young Airedales and owners who are novices when it comes to field training.

The Hunting Instinct Test as a Starting Point

If you're bringing a puppy or new dog to the Nationals for the first time, be sure to enter the Hunting Instinct Test to give him or her the first taste of field experience. This test is designed to evaluate the hunting instincts of pups around 6 months of age and up (that is, they've finished teething and have adult dentition). Older dogs may also be entered in the test if they haven't had prior field training.

In this informal test, pups will be assessed on such things as their natural prey drive and retrieving instincts, on their reaction to encountering live caged game, and their inclination to follow a scent track, and on their willingness to go into the water. Pups are scored on each "exercise," and those who score at least 70 out of 100 possible points "qualify" and receive a certificate.

Airedale pups often surprise their owners with their enthusiasm, and more than one future "superstar" pup has pulled its owners into further field efforts. Spectators also enjoy watching the pups go through their paces, especially if they're looking to see what kennels or bloodlines are producing pups that do well.

The timing of the Hunting Instinct Test on Friday afternoon allows owners to participate in the Beginners' Retriever Workshop, as sessions don't overlap.

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Patricia Rose's Beginner and Advanced Retriever Workshops

Pat Rose has been an AKC-licensed Retriever Test judge since 2012, but she has been in on the movement to have Poodles recognized as hunting dogs for about as long as HWA founders were talking about hunting Airedales. Poodles were allowed to run in AKC Retriever Tests about 10 years before Airedales could enter AKC Upland Tests. Pat now observes that Airedale handlers are "about where Poodles were 10 years ago" as far as retrieving skills. And she's happy to help us improve on that.

So we're pleased that Pat Rose will present the Beginners' Workshop at this year's Nationals. This workshop will be spread over sessions on Friday morning and afternoon, plus Saturday morning. The timing is scheduled to give participants a chance to take part in other activities such as the Hunting Instinct Test and Barkathon, or even enter a Fur Test. Skills covered in the Beginners' Workshop will be tailored to participants, but emphasis will be on basic retriever skills such as marking (watching and remembering) the fall of an object (bumper or bird), picking it up, and bringing it back to the handler. Between those three simple points is a world of techniques and drills on land and water. While Pat may not have time to cover more than the basics, she will point you in the right direction to continue your training efforts.

Pat Rose's Advanced Retriever Workshop will take place on Sunday afternoon after lunch and the Awards Ceremony. We invite those who have already progressed through Junior Test level retriever skills to stay on for it. New this year, we're offering this in response to those who requested guidance in training for advanced skills such as multiple marks and blind retrieves. We encourage those who have entered the HWA Retriever Test that Pat judged earlier this weekend to stay on for her tips on how to improve training results. If you live a distance from Holly Hills, this may mean you'll want to book Sunday night at the hotel after a full afternoon of training, but we feel it will be worth it to serious trainers.

In Memory of Pam Tanner

On May 5, 2018, longtime HWA member Pamela Tanner lost her 5-vear battle with cancer. In spite of her illness, Pam remained active in HWA until recent times. We're gratified to see so many people are interested in Airedales in the field.

Get An Early Birdy Puppy

Is this summer your time for a new Airedale puppy? Lucky you, since long days and warm weather are perfect for enjoying your pup's energy and antics.

But, if you have the intention of future field work with that pup, its time to follow the practices common in other sporting dog breeds. Let that puppy be "birdy" while he's still a baby in order to imprint him as a life-long hunting machine. Few serious trainers / hunters put off field training until a dog is mostly grown up.

Picking a "birdy" pup is a starting point. Sporting dog breeders typically puppy test their litters by watching which ones "light up" when meeting a live game bird or pigeon. Though few Airedale breeders do this, you might have the chance to bring a freeze-dried pheasant wing (available online or at Cabelas) when you make your pick of the litter. Pick from the pups who clamber over the bird scent and feathers. That laid-back and disinterested pup in the corner may be a cute pet, not its a good performance prospect.



Show your pup live birds as soon as possible. They say it takes a village to raise a child, but it also takes some connections in the bird dog world – whether through a pro trainer or by joining a hunt club --- to find a way to give your pup the excitement of chasing birds and letting his prey instincts kick in early. If you're fortunate enough to have friends in the hunting dog world, bring your pup along to hang out with them.

If you're into throwing toys for your pup to chase and run around with, save a special bumper for puppy hallway retriever practice. When you toss that special training bumper, throw it down a narrow hallway so that the pup has little chance to do anything with it but run back towards you with it. This is only a game, but if your pup's up for it, he's already learning to bring things to you rather than playing keep-away.

Accustom your pup to gunfire or loud popping noises early. If you belong to a hunt club, let the pup hang out and play with the pup a good distance from the gunfire at first, then gradually come up closer when he shows it doesn't bother him. If you can't get him around gunfire, try Dale Burrier's trick of blowing air into a brown paper lunch bag, and popping the bag a good distance from the pup when he's totally into roughhousing or eating. Gradually you can make those gunfire-like bag pops closer to the pup as long as he's still ignoring them. Later, gunfire sounds pretty much just like a bag pop to him.

Get your puppy swimming as young as possible. Like human babies, puppies have lots of impulsive action before their more mature "caution" filters kick in. Summer is an ideal time for you to wade into a pond or pool carrying your pup so that he swims back to shore without even thinking about it. He doesn't need a flotation device. Moving his legs in some sort of dogpaddle action comes naturally. If you've got other dogs or people swimming with you, so much the better. The pup will grow up thinking swimming is great fun.



Many trainers say to let a puppy be a pup and just play before starting planned training, but in truth, puppies start learning from the minute you bring them into your home. You might as well have a lot of "fun with a purpose" with your birdy Airedale puppy.

Fun in the Field Photo Page

This year's **Fun in the Field** weekend took place on April 14-15th at Holly Hills Game Preserve (which is also the site of our Nationals). Fun in the Field is an annual spring field training weekend for Airedales.

This year we had a smaller group than usual, which gave us time for repeated practice sessions in tracking and barking at the raccoon tree. In another field, we had plenty of pheasants (even late-season roosters) for upland flushing and retrieving practice. For those just starting out, Dale Burrier gave an "Intro to Game Birds" session that was a lot of fun for new dogs. It was a no-test, no-stress, casual weekend for enjoying our dogs together.

We hope these photos bring back good memories for those of us who were there, AND if you couldn't come, we hope these will give you a good idea of all Airedales can do. Picture yourself there next April!
